Branding was a common punishment in colonial America. The letter used for branding was defined to fit the offense. Thieves usually had "T" branded on their hand. A brand could be applied to hands, cheeks, shoulders, or foreheads, as a way to publically mark the offense.

Other crimes, however, were punishable by shaming the convicted through public humiliation. In order to achieve this, they used many different forms of punishment against those who were convicted of committing a crime, or straying from the Puritan lifestyle. Another unusual form of punishment was the "Ducking Stool". Examples of Punishable Crimes

Crime and Punishment in Puritan England Facts & Information

The Puritans never incarcerated prisoners for a long time. They accepted capital punishment, though, for 12 crimes, including blasphemy, counterfeiting and witchcraft. Puritan law recognized the principle that no one should be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process. They also explicitly limited government power.

The Puritans got fed up. On July 17, 1658, they dragged Holder and Copeland to prison and chopped off both men's right ears. They were kept in prison, where they were brutally and repeatedly whipped on a set schedule for nine weeks straight. Then, finally, they were forcibly sent back to England.

Peine forte et dure (Law French for "forceful and hard punishment") was a method of torture formerly used in the common law legal system, in which a defendant who refused to plead ("stood mute") would be subjected to having heavier and heavier stones placed upon his or her chest until a plea was entered, or as the weight of the stones on the chest became too great for the condemned to breathe, fatal suffocation would occur.

Puritan Punishments -Branding

The Puritans frowned on sexual offenses as evidenced from the number of documented laws and convictions for sexual offenses. The most commonly committed offense was fornication. Typically, the punishment was a whipping, sitting in the stocks or a fine. Bastardy, or producing a child out of wedlock, received more severe punishment.

Puritan Punishments Though puritans thought of themselves as moral and religious there were many crimes that occurred in those times. In colonial America, the troublemakers were punished in the center of town for the entire public to see. They served their time while the town people scoffed at them. The puritans liked to humiliate people.

Generally, puritans left punishments up to the child's parents, unless the court felt that the child new right from wrong. Whippings were typically the harshest

A scold's bridle, sometimes called a witch's bridle, a brank's bridle, or simply branks, was an instrument of punishment, as a form of torture and public humiliation. The device was an iron muzzle in an iron framework that enclosed the head (although some bridles were masks that depicted suffering). A bridle-bit (or curb-plate), about 2 in × 1 in (5.1 cm × 2.5 cm) in size, was slid into the

offence. A second offence increased the fine to five pounds, and, if the Bench thought it necessary, a "bound to the behavior." In 1658, the enactment was included in the codification of laws.

Therefore Puritan courts were very strict with those people who broke Puritan laws. Some crimes were punishable by death, including witchcraft, murder and treason, while others crimes were usually punished by whipping, prison, fines or time in the stocks, where your arms and hands were pinned down (sometimes people threw old fruit at you)
