This is an astonishing exploration of the pain of memory, the nature of stoic hope, and the ineradicability of grief.

I think it is because without dream 'antelopes' to chase we become what a lapdog is to a wolf. And we are inherently more like wolves than lapdogs, because the communal chase is part of our biological makeup."
